


Overview of Oncology Nutrition There are more than 200 different types of cancer, each with its own etiology, set of potential treatment regimens, and likelihood of response to treatment. RDNs working in oncology practice settings must have the appropriate knowledge, skills, and competence to provide safe and effective nutrition care across the lifespan and the cancer continuum (prevention, treatment, and survivorship). Oncology practice RDNs work in a variety of settings with a full range of roles and responsibilities, e.g., clinician, manager, and program director in healthcare and community setting; academia, research; and federal, state, and local agencies. 


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

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Case Study Examples of indicators related to case here: Indicator 1.1A Assesses primary cancer diagnosis and effect on indigestion, digestion, absorption and utilization of nutrients. Indicator 1.4 B Assess for signs and symptoms of the cancer process and/or treatment related complications (eg, mucositis, diarrhea, cachexia, dysgeusia), and other nutrition impact symptoms. Indicator 3.1 addresses the nutrition diagnoses by determining and prioritizing appropriate interventions for the plan of care. Indicator 3.6 Develops the nutrition prescription and establishes measurable patient/client focused goals to be accomplished.
